HOW IT WILL WORK

THURSDAY 5 NOVEMBER: ONLINE DAY (10am–5pm)

On 5 November, there will be an online day, with an international line-up of presenters.

FRIDAY 6 NOVEMBER: CREATIVE PRACTICES DAY (9am–4.15pm)

Delegates will work for a day with leading practitioners, and also observe or participate in a drama session in a local school. You will be able to choose between a primary school, and a secondary school. This year, the schools will be Woodrow First School, Redditch and Tudor Grange Academy, Worcester. This is a great opportunity to see drama work in practice.

There will be a two-day conference weekend, with practical drama workshops and panel discussions, and an international line-up of presenters.

CONFERENCE THEME: DRAMA AND THE WORLD

One of the ideas behind the Dorothy Heathcote Now conferences, is that we come together to engage in active research – and so each year, there is a topic or theme at the centre of the event. This year, we have chosen: Drama and the World.

Dorothy stated: “I have a dream that has not yet been realized ... I want students to be citizens of the world.” Her dream was never just about young people learning facts about the world. It was about helping them live in it — responsibly, imaginatively, and with an eye for other people’s lives. To be a “citizen of the world” isn’t just about knowledge. It’s about understanding other perspectives, working together across differences, and thinking ethically about your place in the world.

Her work has travelled far and wide — through her own teaching in Canada, America, New Zealand, Australia, Norway, Türkiye, Ireland and South Africa, and through the teachers and facilitators who studied with her and took her ideas to new contexts. Today, her influence is growing in countries such as India, China and Belgium.

This isn’t just the spread of a method; it’s an international movement, constantly growing and adapting. When Dorothy’s ideas are applied in different countries and schools, they meet new challenges and possibilities. How do the core ideas travel across cultures? What changes, and what stays essential?

A key idea for Dorothy was what she called “the substance of we-feeling,” a phrase from Doris Lessing. It’s what happens “when human beings get together and collaborate in bridging the spaces between.” It’s not about being the same or agreeing all the time. It’s about working across difference, listening, observing, and making something together.

This year, as the world feels increasingly divided, that kind of collaboration feels more important than ever. Drama gives young people the space to practise this: to pay attention to others, to hold different perspectives, to face uncertainty, and to act together responsibly. It helps them not just understand the world, but engage with it meaningfully.

The conference will explore these ideas through three strands:

How is Dorothy’s work being used in different contexts?

What happens when Mantle of the Expert and other approaches are used in different schools and cultures? What stays central, and what adapts?

What are the possibilities for international collaboration?

How can we work across borders — through shared projects, discussions, and connections — to extend opportunities for young people to learn and create together?

How can we work with material from other cultures, or deal with encounters with difference?

How do we do this respectfully and thoughtfully, and help young people engage with people, stories, and experiences that are new to them?

“Drama and the World” is about exploring the link between classroom practice and global citizenship. If, as Dorothy believed, education is about awakening reflective, attentive people, then drama offers the space to practise the habits needed for living in a shared world. We look forward to coming together — from near and far — to explore what happens when we collaborate, bridge gaps, and build understanding across the spaces between us. Join us, as we explore these questions through practical workshops, talks, performances, demonstration classes, online panels, and more!

The day will be led by David Allen & Roberta Luchini, from the Mantle Network. The curriculum focus is Anglo-Saxon Britain. The session in Tudor Grange Academy will focus on strategies such as teacher-in-role, and the use of drama conventions.

ABOUT THE VENUE

BY TRAIN

There are two train stations in Worcester: Worcester Foregate Street and Worcester Shrub Hill. There is also another station, Worcestershire Parkway, a short taxi ride away. Trains run from Birmingham and from London; there is a taxi rank outside Worcester Foregate Station. Approximate travel times:

- Birmingham New Street - 50 minutes
- London Paddington - 2 hours 20 minutes
- Manchester Piccadilly - 2 hours 30 minutes

BY CAR

Worcester is served by the M5 motorway and is accessible from Junctions 6 and 7. Under normal traffic conditions all university campuses can be reached in 15-20 minutes from Junction 7.

BY BUS

First Bus services 31, 31A, and U1 connect the St John's Campus to the City Centre Bus Station.

CAR PARKING

There is a visitors' car park (Car Park B) on St John's Campus, with Pay and Display machines to purchase parking tickets.

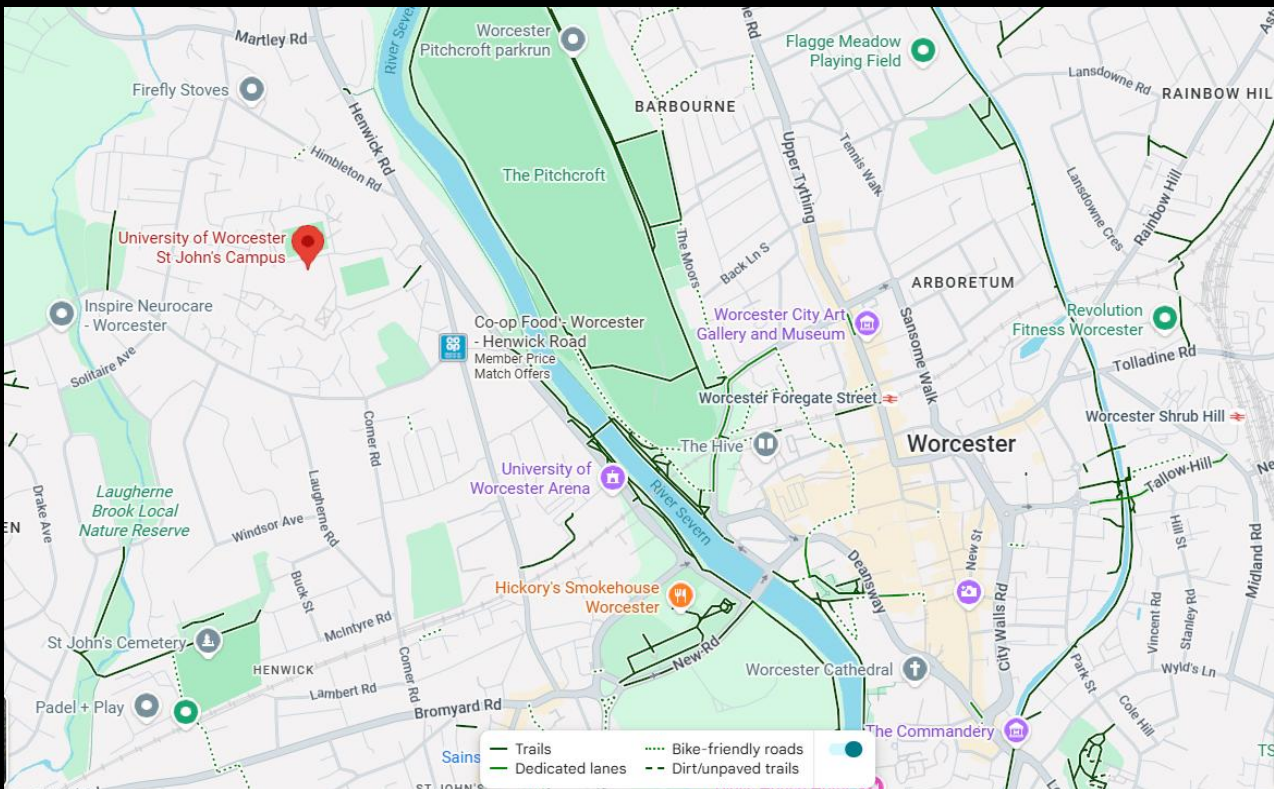
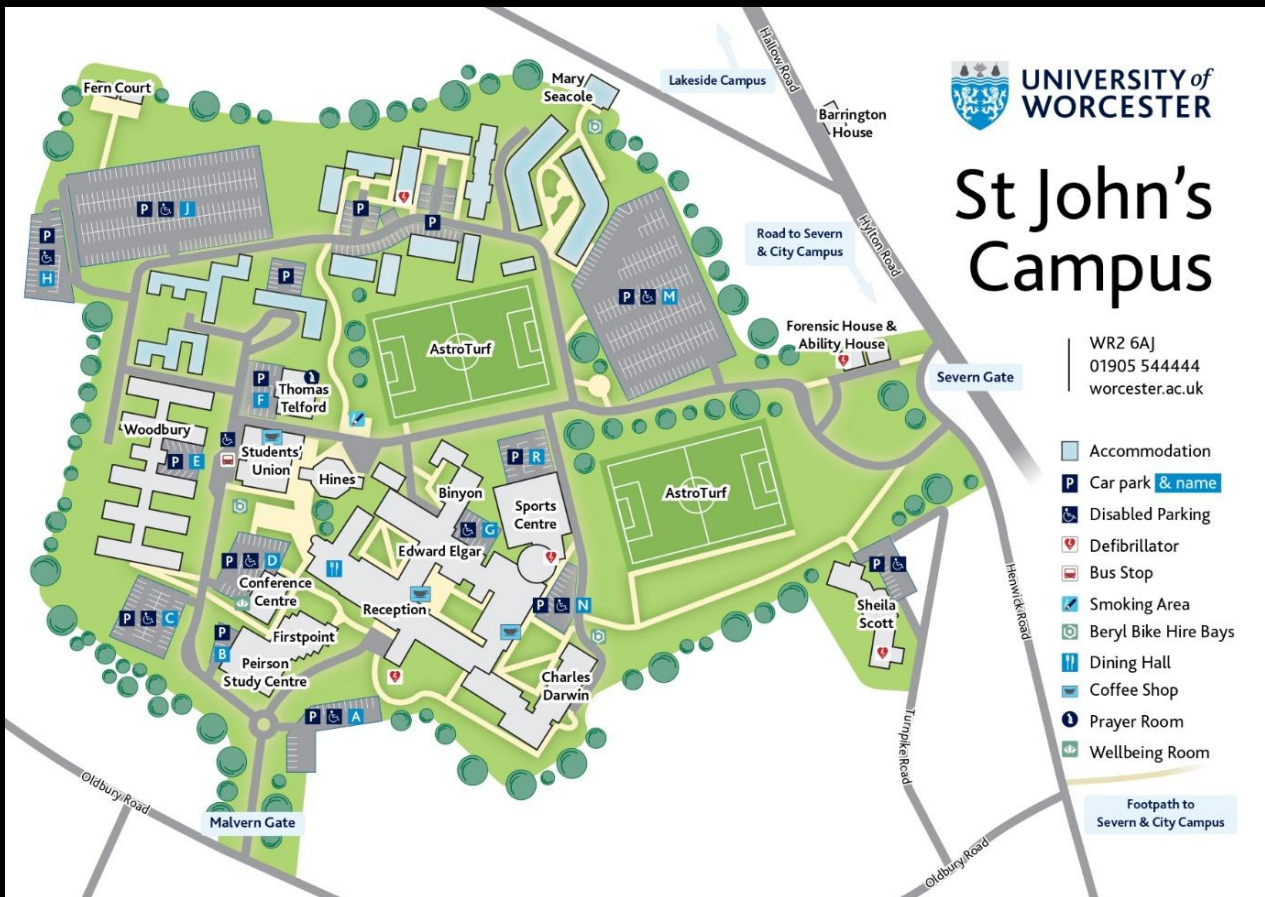
